




THE KITCHEN BY COOKING WITH QUE:

A Hub for Culinary Excellence



The Kitchen by Cooking with Que is more than just a shared-use commercial kitchen; it is a dynamic space for culinary innovation, education, and community engagement. Designed as both a state-of-the-art kitchen and an intimate 22-seat classroom, The Kitchen serves as a gathering place where chefs,



food lovers, and aspiring culinary artists can come together to share their passion for food. Through chef tastings, cooking demonstrations, and private dining events, The Kitchen provides an immersive culinary experience for Metro Detroit's vibrant and diverse food culture.

Founded by Quiana "Que" Rice, The Kitchen also functions as a resource for licensed culinary experts who lack physical brick-and-mortar locations. It is a laboratory for learning and experimentation, offering a unique platform for chefs to refine their craft, test new menus, and connect with food enthusiasts.

In 2024, The Kitchen faced an exciting but daunting challenge—being selected to provide food service for the NFL Draft, an event expected to bring hundreds of thousands of visitors to Detroit. To meet this demand, Que needed a financial boost to secure products and scale operations. She turned to Black



Leaders Detroit for a no-interest loan, and the process exceeded her expectations.

"Working with BLD was the simplest loan process I've ever done," says Que. "I talked to one person the entire time, everything was digital, and within 30, 60, 90 days, we had our funding. There were no hidden fees—just \$25,000, same as cash. It was an absolute blessing."

The impact of the funding was immediate. With access to capital, The Kitchen was able to procure the necessary ingredients, expand staffing, and ensure smooth operations for the high-profile event. Beyond the NFL Draft, the loan has positioned The Kitchen for sustainable growth, allowing it to continue supporting local chefs and food entrepreneurs.

Que passionately advocates for Black Leaders Detroit, urging other business owners to take advantage of its resources. "I don't know why thousands of people aren't applying for this as

SAM TROTTER & MERGING ART, FOOD, AND JANTAE' SPINKS: SOMEDAY

Sam Trotter and Jantae' Spinks, the visionaries behind Someday, are redefining creative spaces in Detroit. Their hybrid venture—a fine arts gallery and bakery-merges culinary and visual artistry while providing a platform for underrepresented artists. With a nonprofit arm, We Will, they extend their mission further by offering mentorship, career advancement, and access to fine arts and culinary industries for marginalized communities.

Trotter and Spinks bring a wealth of experience from their time working in New York and Los Angeles with brands like Complex, Rolling Stone, and Adidas. After years of navigating the corporate creative world, they returned to Detroit to create a space that centers the voices and experiences of people of African descent.

Their first engagement with Black Leaders Detroit was through the More Money, More Impact seminar. "BLD was one of the first organizations to welcome us back into Detroit's entrepreneurial ecosystem with open arms," says Trotter. Since then, Someday has received grant funding to support their Milk & Honey Accessibility Program, which provides complimentary tea and baked goods to visitors, ensuring hospitality remains at the core of their space. Funding also helped facilitate their inaugural student exhibition, Seedling, which brought together emerging artists and established curators.



"Black Leaders Detroit is serious about uplifting Black businesses," says Trotter. "It's not just financial support—they provide real connections and opportunities that foster sustainability."

Looking ahead, Someday aims to expand its programs, create more communal experiences, and deepen collaborations that amplify artists and chefs of African descent. Through partnerships like the one with Black Leaders Detroit, Trotter and Spinks are proving that creativity, commerce, and community can thrive together in Detroit.





JAMES "SCREAL" EBERHEART, JR.: BUILDING COLLECTIVE POWER

James "Screal" Eberheart, Jr. is the visionary founder and Executive Director of Motivating Inner New Dreams (M.I.N.D.S.), an organization dedicated to community transformation through entrepreneurship, mental wellness, civic engagement, and empowerment.



In 2024, he received a \$2,500 grant at Black Leaders Detroit's More Money, More Impact fund development seminar. Unlike many funding opportunities, these unrestricted dollars allowed him to invest directly in his Community Volunteer Leadership Council (CVLC) in District 7, providing small stipends to volunteers and supporting his own wellness. "Most funding is restricted, but Black Leaders Detroit understands that people know what they need. That's powerful."

Eberheart sees Black Leaders Detroit as a crucial force in economic justice, ensuring dollars from persons of African descent support their communities. "We talk about economic power, but Black Leaders Detroit is actively building it." His commitment to economic empowerment extends to his spending habits-intentionally supporting businesses owned by individuals of African descent that reinvest in the community.

Looking ahead, Eberheart is focused on expanding his impact. Through professional development and digital equity work at the state level, he is gaining new tools to bring resources back to Detroit. He also emphasizes sustainability—investing in his family and community while mentoring the next generation of leaders. "We can't just talk about change; we have to build the systems and structures that make it real."

Eberheart's work aligns deeply with Black Leaders Detroit's mission, proving that when given the right resources, entrepreneurs and community leaders of African descent can create lasting change.



WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH















In 2024, our EntrepreneuHERS brunch celebrated the remarkable achievements of women business owners of African descent, providing them with a platform to showcase their businesses and connect with potential supporters. The event brought together entrepreneurs, community members, and partners in an atmosphere of collaboration and empowerment. Through networking and inspiring conversations, we created an environment where women could share their journeys and amplify their voices in the business world.

As part of the event, a pitch competition allowed four exceptional entrepreneurs to present their businesses to the attendees, who voted on the winners. Thanks to a generous funder, the prize amounts were doubled, with the top four recipients receiving \$10,000, \$6,000, \$4,000, and \$1,000 in unrestricted capital. This initiative not only provided vital financial support but also reinforced our commitment to lifting up women entrepreneurs, ensuring they have the resources and opportunities needed to thrive. We were honored to celebrate these women and look forward to the continued impact of their work in our community.

LISA SESSIONS:

A TESTAMENT TO ENTREPRENEURIAL RESILIENCE

Lisa Sessions, CEO and founder of DeBomb Taco, embodies the spirit of perseverance and innovation in Detroit's food scene. From her humble beginnings launching a food truck, Sessions has grown her business with strategic support from Black Leaders Detroit, receiving funding through grants, a no-interest loan, and participation in the Black Friday campaign.

Her first grant came at the 2023 Detroit Means Business Summit, providing a crucial boost as she transitioned from full-time employment to full-time entrepreneurship. Later, she secured second place in the 2024 Entrepreneur Her competition, expecting \$3,000 but receiving a generous \$6,000 after a surprise match. Additionally, a no-interest loan allowed her to refinance high-interest debt from her food truck renovation, freeing up capital to reinvest in growth.




RISING BLACK LEADERS

In 2024, Black Leaders Detroit launched Rising Black Leaders (RBL), created by interns Ayodele Uhuru and Alana Weems to support Detroit's youth and foster a more diverse audience. RBL provides young entrepreneurs of African descent with grants, loans, mentorship, and access to an organization committed to social change, empowering them to overcome financial barriers and succeed.

For our first RBL event, we celebrated Market Day, hosted by BLD member Clarence Houston in collaboration with University Prep Art & Design and the Empowered Youth Entrepreneurship program. The event featured young entrepreneurs showcasing their creations, with BLD awarding grants to three promising business owners to support their growth and development.





EMPOWERING YOUNG ENTREPRENEURS: CLARENCE HOUSTON'S IMPACT

For over a decade, Clarence Houston has shaped young minds as an educator in Midtown Detroit. Passionate about economics and entrepreneurship, he led the Youth Empowered Entrepreneurship Program at UPrep Art & Design, where students develop and launch business concepts, gaining real-world skills.



Now a Humanities Instructional Coach, Houston mentors teachers to sustain entrepreneurship education while ensuring the program's longevity.

In 2023, Black Leaders Detroit partnered with Houston to award Rising Black Leaders grants to three standout student entrepreneurs. Taylor Hill launched a Cajun-inspired food business and now attends Louisiana State University. Taesean Parnell started a clothing brand in high school, and Laylah Christian developed a skincare line while joining the Michigan Black Business Alliance.

"Black Leaders Detroit made entrepreneurship feel real," says Houston. "Having them at Market Day and graduation legitimized this as a viable career path."

Looking ahead, Houston is eager to expand youth entrepreneurship programs and deepen partnerships that uplift young entrepreneurs of African descent. His work exemplifies Black Leaders Detroit's mission: investing in businesses and organizations led by individuals of African descent to build a more equitable future.

JUNETEENTH Jubilee

Since 2019, Juneteenth Jubilee Detroit has remained committed to honoring Juneteenth Freedom Day with a mission to celebrate, educate, and empower the community. The 2024 celebration exceeded expectations, highlighting the dedication of our passionate community members and the invaluable partnerships with organizations working toward Black community progress in Detroit.

The weekend kicked off on Friday, June 14th, with an engaging block party hosted in collaboration with the Motown Museum. This interactive event celebrated the cultural significance of Juneteenth through art, music, and educational experiences, setting the tone for the weekend's festivities. On Saturday, June 15th, Liberation For Life took place at the Joseph Walker Williams Community Center, offering a dynamic program filled with panel discussions, a bustling marketplace, culinary delights, fitness activities, and a vibrant kid's zone. This event emphasized health, wealth, and education while fostering community connections.

The celebration concluded on Sunday, June 16th, with the Juneteenth Freedom Festival, a collaborative effort with the City of Detroit, Metro Detroit Black Business Alliance, Detroit Branch NAACP, Charles H. Wright Museum of African American History, and Eastern Market Conservancy. This family-friendly event showcased local artists, celebrated Detroit's rich cultural heritage, and offered diverse activities for all ages. Throughout the weekend, we proudly hosted over 12,000 attendees, engaged with more than 40 vendors focused on health, wealth, and education, and supported over 150 Black-owned businesses.

We distributed 300 gift certificates totaling \$12,500, making a meaningful impact on our community.

The event was met with great enthusiasm, as community mem-

bers came together to support this initiative. Black-owned grocery stores play a crucial role in Detroit's economy and culture, providing essential goods while fostering strong community ties. By supporting these stores, we contribute to the sustainability and empowerment of our neighborhoods.

As the owner of Tauntus, a boutique specializing in fraternity and sorority gear, Nadonya Muslim has built a thriving business in Detroit. Dedicated to community engagement and economic empowerment, she actively supports local businesses owned by Detroiters of African descent.

Muslim first connected with Black Leaders Detroit through Sharea Ayers and has since become a key partner in the Black Friday initiative. The program has brought new customers to Tauntus through gift certificate distributions, many of whom have returned long after the promotion ended.

"Before Black Leaders Detroit's Black Friday program, small businesses like mine often stayed closed on the biggest shopping day of the year," says Muslim. "Now, thanks to their support, we see real traffic, real sales, and new loyal customers."

A strong advocate for Black Leaders Detroit, Muslim actively encourages others to donate and join the movement. "This is an organization where you can see exactly where your money is going. They invest directly in Black businesses, creating a cycle of support that uplifts our entire community."


BUILD TO LAST
