

Significantly, Brown's entrepreneurial path has been shaped by self-reliance and strategic growth, underpinned by the wisdom of his forebears. This collaboration not only underlined Three Thirteen's capacity for major partnerships but also highlighted the critical role of accessible funding in bridging the gap between small businesses and corporate entities. Three Thirteen also benefited from a significant boost with a \$10,000 grant from the Small Business To Scale initiative, a partnership between Black Leaders Detroit and Huntington Bank designed to support and empower local enterprises.

Looking ahead, Brown envisions Three Thirteen evolving not through expansion but by deepening its roots within the Detroit community. By diversifying product lines and enhancing the brand's experiential aspects, he aims to cement Three Thirteen's legacy as a beacon of Detroit's culture and entrepreneurial spirit. Through his leadership, Three Thirteen exemplifies the profound impact of visionary entrepreneurship combined with a heartfelt commitment to community enrichment, setting a standard for future generations in Detroit and beyond.
